Study Calls for More Staff in 911 Center

As the county switches from traditional methods of taking 911 calls, over standard telephone lines, to more technologically advanced ones, the county's emergency call center will need more staff to manage the change, officials say.

A study commissioned by the county in November of last year and undertaken by consultants the Mission Critical Partners stated that more staff will be needed to both handle increased call volumes as well as duties such as

paper work certifications that the state requires of the county to account for its change over the what is known as next generation 911 capabilities.


"911 is changing in this country fundamentally," Mission Critical representative Heather McGaffin told the Commissioners of St. Mary's County. "As we migrate to the next generation 911 you'll see things become more [computing] cloud based."

The transition, she said, would transform 911 calling from copper telephone wires to fiber and digital-based platforms.

Also, whereas in the past maintenance and support would come from telecommunications providers who lived locally, support would, in the future, be done remotely.

"You will need more folks in-house who are comfortable with what's going on," McGaffin said.

The study also said the county should improve its hiring and promotional practices for bringing on new 911 call center specialists as older employees begin to retire.

"The [toll] on 911 dispatchers has increased," she said, adding that an increase in dispatchers would allow supervisors to stay in their roll instead of acting as backup dispatchers.

Another shift in the way 911 calls are taken means that callers will be able to text an emergency message for a response; this will also necessitate more employees to keep up with the new calls for service.

"You'll have to have folks in the chairs to take that information," McGaffin said.

County Emergency Management director Stephen Walker said the migration to next generation 911 is part of his department's effort to follow a master plan for improvement over the next five years.

The Department of Emergency Services has never before

had a master plan, Walker said.

"This is a roadmap for us and where we're going to go in the next three to five years." Walker told commissioners.

Nighttime Inspection of Thomas Johnson Bridge Begins Aug. 5

On Monday, Aug. 5, the Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration (MDOT SHA) will begin a week-long routine bridge inspection of the MD 4 (Patuxent Beach Road) Bridge over the Patuxent River (Governor Thomas Johnson Bridge) at the Calvert/St. Mary's County line. The inspection will take place Monday, Aug. 5, through Thursday, Aug. 8, from 9 p.m. until 5 a.m. the following morning.

During the inspection, crews will close one lane and alternate traffic in the open lane using flagging operations. Portable variable message signs have been placed along area State routes to make travelers aware of the lane closure. The inspection will be performed by MDOT SHA contractor AECOM.

Drivers will be directed using a flagging operation each evening between 9 p.m. and 5 a.m. the following morning

"Senior" Retired Deputies Want Benefits Increase

Citing the rising cost of living expenses, eight retired sheriff's office deputies are petitioning the county government's Sheriff's Office Retirement Plan (SORP), for an increase in their retirement pay.

Retired deputies receive a cost of living adjustment from SORP but they argue that the planned increases have not kept up with rising costs; several recent salary increases for deputies ensure that those deputies will receive higher levels of retirement benefits, the deputies, who refer to themselves as senior retirees say.

"Members retiring now, and in the future, will receive a higher rate of retirement pay than members who retired under the lower pay scales for doing the same work," the retirees stated in a missive to County Administrator Dr. Rebecca Bridgett. "Our perception is there is a lack of equity in the retirement benefit for senior retirees."

The letter states that the eight retires requesting the increase all left the agency prior to 2002.

The petitioners want SORP to investigate raising their pay commensurate with recent salary increases for active deputies.

"We request that the Sheriff's Office Retirement Plan Board explore increasing the pay for its senior retirees, in effect granting us a pay raise similar to the sheriff's office pay scale adjustments that were made over the years for active duty personnel," the letter states.

Alisa Casas, county public information officer, said the SORP board decided to gather more information about the retirees' request before bringing any recommendations before the Commissioners of St. Mary's County.

Of particular interest is determining whether a benefits increase has been authorized before beyond the normal cost of living adjustments in the plan, Casas said.

The next meeting for the sheriff's office retirement plan board is Aug. 22 at 1 p.m.

Commissioners Seek Grant Funding for St. Jerome Creek Project

The Commissioners of St. Mary's County approved Tuesday a request from the county's public works department to apply for a state grant to cover local expenses for a study to find ways to prevent or slow down shoaling, the accumulation of sand, in St. Jerome Creek in the southern portion of the county.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is currently seeking federal funds to move ahead to study the potential of putting a jetty, a breakwater or barrier, at St. Jerome Creek to combat the seeping in of sand that creates shoals inside the creek's boundaries.

The vote in support of seeking the grant from the state's Department of Natural Resources (DNR) was unanimous.

St. Jerome Creek is a critical part of safe navigation on the Chesapeake Bay, the mouth of the creek is the only designated safe harbor on the bay for a 26-mile span from Point Lookout in St. Mary's to Solomons in Calvert County.

Increased sand and other sediments that flow into the creek make it difficult if not impossible for boats to sail in and find safe harbor in the event of an emergency.

The total estimated cost of the study of a jetty's effectiveness is \$335,300, of which federal funding would cover \$167,650; the county is seeking grant money in the amount of \$118,150 to cover its share of the cost.

The county can expect to be notified by DNR if it wins the grant money by either April of May of next year, according to county documents.

The state and federal channels have been dredged several times to remove shoaling in 2006 and the state controlled channel was dredged in 2010 and 2014, according to county documents.

Dredging of the federally controlled portion of the channel took place early last year.

Trail Walk to Memorialize Murder Victim

Family and friends of Moneta Strickland, a 32 year old nurse who was brutally murdered while jogging on Three Notch Trail in Mechanicsville six years ago will walk the trail this Saturday to honor her memory.

Thelma Strickland, Moneta's mother, said for the past five years the family and Moneta's friends have gathered to take the trail walk for her daughter.

"We say the rosary as we go along," she told The County Times. "We reminisce a little."

When the family reaches the spot where her daughter was found they cite Scripture passages before returning to John V. Baggett Park.

Moneta was found dead on Three Notch Trail in August of 2013 and sheriff's office detectives quickly developed a local sex offender, John Quade, Jr. as the prime suspect in her killing.

Video surveillance obtained from a nearby business across Route 235 from an entrance to the trail showed Quade parking his vehicle in the store's lot and walking back across the road towards the trail.

When Quade was questioned by police detectives he said he had contact with Strickland on the trail while she was jogging and did not remember details of the encounter.

He claimed to have blacked out during the assault but police determined that Strickland had died from blunt force trauma.

lowing year, Judge David Densford sentenced Quade to 30 years in prison for Strickland's murder after a jury convicted him of second-degree murder.

After six years of memorializing her daughter, Thelma Strickland is petitioning the county's Department of Recreation and Parks to have a bench placed at the site of her daughter's death so trail visitors can also honor her memory.

"We just hope more people will join us this year," Thelma Strickland said. "It was a trail she always ran.

"This way people will be on their guard and not run alone."

Calvert Man Charged in Loveville Assault Case

St. Mary's police have served firstand-second-degree assault warrants against a Huntingtown man for allegedly committing an assault against another motorist on Route 5 in Leonardtown last week.

According to St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office spokesperson Jason Babcock, Chance Edward Leach, 18, had been tailgating the victim who was driving south bound on Route 5 July 24 when he passed the victim on the shoulder and got in front of the victim's vehicle.

When the victim shrugged his shoulders after being cutoff the defendant allegedly reached into the rear passenger area of his truck and withdrew what was later found to be an airsoft pistol and pointed it rearwards at the victim.

The victim then followed Leach to the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) office in Loveville and told the staff there to call 911.

Officers who responded entered with their weapons at the ready, one witness told The County Times, as they were told by staff that the victim had been

shot at, though they ascertained later that no shots had been fired.

The suspect was detained there by police.

The incident brought as many as a dozen police vehicles streaming through Leonardtown with their sirens blaring according to one witness who had just left the MVA office that day, leading some to fear that there had been a shooting there.

No one was injured in the alleged assault.

Mechanicsville Man Dies in Ocean City Collision



Ocean City police officers are continuing to investigate a fatal crash involving a motorcycle that occurred

Tuesday, July 30, 2019.

Officers attempted to initiate a traffic stop on a motorcycle in the area of 45th

Street. The motorcycle fled from officers, at which time the officers did not pursue the motorcycle and lost sight of the driver.

Ashley Miller, spokesperson for the Ocean City Police Department said the driver in the fatal crash was Brian Douglas II, of Mechanicsville.

At approximately 9:44 p.m., Ocean City Communications received a call regarding a serious accident northbound at 59th Street on Coastal Highway. The preliminary investigation revealed that a motorcycle ran a red light and collided with a Ford Explorer that was attempting to make a U-turn northbound onto

Coastal Highway. Investigation revealed that the motorcycle involved in the incident was from the attempted traffic stop at 45th street. Douglas was pronounced deceased at the scene. The three occupants of the Ford Explorer were not injured.

Miller said just three minutes elapsed between the time when officers attempted a traffic stop and the crash.

Northbound lanes of Coastal Highway were closed for several hours and a traffic pattern was established by Ocean City Public Works. Ocean City's Traffic Safety Unit is still investigating the collision at the time of this release.

Hogan Fires Back At Trump Over Baltimore Tweets

Gov. Larry Hogan retaliated against recent statements made by President Donald Trump that Baltimore is "rat and rodent infested" on WBAL News Radio Monday evening, slamming both Trump's comments and federal inaction and divisive politics in helping stressed cities.

"The comments are just outrageous and inappropriate," Hogan said in a telephone call-in interview with host Clarence M. Mitchell IV.

Trump, in making his comments, which were directed at Maryland Dist. 7 Rep. Elijah Cummings, has been accused of racism towards the long-time congressman, but Hogan said the Twitter wars were indicative of the "angry and divisive politics that are tearing America apart."

Hogan said Trump's comments came less than a day after he addressed the National Governor's Association as its new president about how states can find solutions to critical problems while Washington, D.C. is still divided.

"Washington is completely consumed with angry and divisive politics," Hogan said. "Enough is enough; people are completely fed up with this kind of non-sense."

While Trump has been criticized for the manner in which he delivered his comments on Baltimore, the city remains a haven for rats and rodents.

Animal Planet has named Baltimore one of the 10 worst cities in the world for its rat population, while PBS aired a documentary last year on the depth of the rat infestation there.

Even former Baltimore Mayor Catherine Pugh, while touring an East Baltimore neighborhood last year was caught on microphone saying she could smell the rats and dead animals as she passed through.

Hogan said the state has recently invested \$5 billion in restoring Baltimore as well as removing many blighted properties and introducing more law enforcement to stop street violence; he criticized federal officials for bickering instead of solving problems.

"Why are we not focused on solving the problems and getting to work instead of 'who's tweeting about what'..." Hogan said. "It's just absurd.

"What is the President doing? What is the Congress doing?"

Underwater Grasses Show Resilience Despite Record Rainfall

The Maryland Department of Natural Resources reports that Chesapeake Bay underwater grass abundance fared better than expected in 2018, despite extreme rainfall causing a spike in nutrients and sediments. An estimated 50,015 acres of underwater grasses were mapped in Maryland's portion of the Chesapeake Bay.

Baywide, about 91,559 acres of underwater grasses were mapped in 2018. However, more than 20% of the region was not fully mapped in 2018 because of highly turbid water, weather, and security restrictions near military facilities — meaning the actual acreage could be significantly higher.

In 2017, a record-breaking 62,357 acres were recorded in Maryland, and about 105,000 acres were recorded baywide. Since 2012, Maryland has seen a net gain of more than 25,500 acres of underwater grasses and has achieved 63% of the state's 2025 restoration goal.

Except for the upper Western Shore, the record rainfall throughout 2018 led to higher levels of nutrients and sediments and poorer water clarity in many of Maryland's waterways. The prolonged muddy waters caused by these nutrients and sediments led to substantial declines in underwater grasses throughout large portions of the Potomac and Patuxent rivers. However, grasses expanded in the Bush, Patapsco, and Magothy rivers where nutrient and sediment inputs were not as excessive.

"The resilience of Maryland's underwater grasses shows that our commitment to improving the health of the Chesapeake Bay is working and with continued efforts, we are well on our way to achieving our 2025 goal of 79,800 acres," Maryland Department of Natural Resources Secretary Jeannie Haddaway-Riccio said.



Despite the slight decline in statewide underwater grass abundance, all or part of eight Maryland rivers surpassed their restoration goals. These included the Northeast River at 105%; the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal at 236%; the tidal fresh portion of the Chester River at 47,057% (the percentage of the goal attained is so high due to a very small segment restoration goal); the middle Chester River at 282%; the western branch of the Patuxent River at 146%; the upper Gunpowder River at 157%; the Bush River at 104%; the upper portion of the Big Annemessex River at 161%; and Fishing Bay at 102%. An additional four river segments in Maryland reached 75% or more of their restoration goals.

Underwater grasses respond quickly to improvements in water quality conditions, making them a critical indicator of restoration progress. Less nutrient and sediment pollution leads to improved water clarity, which in turn, allows for increased underwater grass growth. Also known as submerged aquatic vegetation (SAV), underwater grasses are a critically important bay habitat that removes nutrients and sediment from the water column, reduce shoreline erosion, provide nursery habitat and protection for species like the blue crab and largemouth bass, and support and sustain migrating waterfowl.


"Last summer's record rainfall – and the accompanying runoff and turbidity – put stress on our underwater grasses, but the previous five years of expansion helped the vast majority of the grass beds survive," said Maryland Natural Resources biologist Brooke Landry, who chairs the SAV workgroup for the Chesapeake Bay Program.

The lower Eastern Shore received significantly less rainfall compared to other regions of the state and water clarity was within range of previous years. As a result, the lower Eastern Shore tributaries, including the Big Annemessex, Manokin, and lower Pocomoke rivers and Tangier Sound, saw increased underwater grass abundance in 2018.

The annual aerial survey was conducted by the Virginia Institute of Marine Science between May and October 2018 and covered 111 flight lines. The aerial imagery is used to identify the amount and location of underwater grasses in the Chesapeake Bay and tidal tributaries.

Additional aerial and satellite imagery was used to augment the imagery in portions of the Bay that could not be mapped.



Loyalty Defines George Guy's

George Guy, known affectionately as Georgie, built Guy Distributing Company in Leonardtown from the success of the locally famous 10 oz. Budweiser Beer can but his reputation was built on his many charitable activities in the community.

Celebrating his 95th birthday last week, Guy said all of the charitable organizations he has joined, all of the donations he continues to give and all of the activities he has sponsored in the past – a major local softball league tournament is just one – have all been out of love for his home county.

"I feel an obligation to my community," Guy told The County Times. "Because we're helping the community."

Guy is a member of the Leonardtown Lions Club, the Knights of Columbus, the Moose Lodge, and the Elks Lodge.

"I appreciate all of the work that these organizations do, they're contributing an awful lot," Guy said.

But Guy has been the most closely associated with the Leonardtown Lions Club; he was just recognized for his service to the club and his perfect attendance to all of its meeting for the past seven decades.

"I've had 70 years in the Lions Club, it's the most important club I've been involved in," Guy said.

Guy lives in Leonardtown and his home is a monu-

ment to his business dealings with Anheuser Busch, filled with beer steins and models and pictures of the Budweiser Clydesdale horses that have been a potent symbol of the beer makers' product.

His walls are festooned with plaques and awards from civic associations across the county for his volunteer work and the fundraising for charities for which he has taken the lead.

One of the biggest fundraising activities he helped lead, the soft ball tournaments, was also one of the longest lived.

"The softball tournaments... were very important," Guy said. "We raised a lot of money and gave it to charities."

Guy estimated that over 30 years of softball tournaments, the games raised more than \$100,000 that was distributed to local charities and service organizations including fire departments and rescue squads.

"I've donated to all the fire departments, rescue squads, the schools, the churches," Guy said. "They all get a piece of the action."

Guy, an avid sports fan, loved to put on the tournaments; they were so popular that at one point the event reached 104 teams.

He lamented that the tournament was now gone.

"The people... they just weren't getting the crowds," Guy said. "The bar owners with ball fields are almost all gone

"It was a sad time when we couldn't have the tournament anymore."

But Guy's time involved in sports spread throughout the county as he was involved in Little League as well as broadcasting over WKIK-AM Chopticon High School football games.

"We did that for quite a few years," Guy said.

Guy is also a long-time fan of the Washington Redskins. He remembers when he could get a season ticket to watch his favorite team for just \$9.

Going to the season opener for the Washington team two years ago was his last one, but prior to that he never missed a season opening game at home in 75 years.

"I just had to go to the games," Guy said.

When he found something he liked, or was important to him, Guy was loathe to give it up for nearly any reason.


"You just get in the habit of doing things to see how far you can go," Guy said.

He even remembers the Washington Senators baseball team and how much he loved them, too.

"Whey they left town, they broke my heart," Guy said. Guy and his family have helped the county in more ways than simply through sports.

Long before St. Mary's Hospice had a home in Callaway and a residential facility there, the top floor of Guy Distributing, in one of its rooms that now houses so much of Guy's sports and Budweiser memorabilia,


hospice was given an operation's center free of charge. From there, the fledgling organization sent out its nurses and doctors to home care visits for the dying all

"They did their training here and their meetings here and they sent their nurses out from here," Guy said, looking over at the room that sits atop Guy Distributing.

"To this day we still give them money," said his daughter Karen, who helps manage the family business.

"They didn't have a home, they used that [room] for 10 years," Guy said. "I was proud to be a part of hospice, helping them get started."

Back in the 1960s, when Karen was still in high school, her father also helped start a campaign, what

he called a Pitch-In effort, to have painted barrels put around Leonardtown for people to place their trash, and trash that was strewn around the town, inside them.

People were also encouraged to pick up roadside trash as well; the program was successful but ultimately had to be shut down due to a fatal flaw.

Working in partnership with the State Highway Administration at the time, who picked up the barrels for ultimate disposal, they stopped doing so when they found that people were bringing their household trash to be thrown away.

"That was quite a program we had," Guy said.

Guy retired from running the family business at the age of 75 and continues to exercise each day, despite having to use a walker.

Though he has managed a beer distributor business that has lasted for more than 80 years, he says he's never touched the stuff.

"I never drank or smoked," Guy said. "I was happy to retire because I didn't want anything to do with computers.

"I let my children take over."

While many of the fundraising activities he started have now faded away, he still contributes from his own retirement and social security, he said.

"I can't give a lot but I give a fair amount," Guy said.



Maryland Career & Technical Students Shine At National Leadership and Skills Conference Half of Maryland Competitors Finish in National Top Ten

Maryland's SkillsUSA delegation brought home 18 medals from the 55th Annual National Leadership and Skills Conference (NLSC), recently held in Louisville, KY. A team of the state's most talented Career and Technical Education (CTE) high school students showcased their skills in 94 CTE competitions. Demonstrating exemplary CTE training, Maryland students challenged 6,400 other student champions from all 50 states, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands.

Maryland students competing in Audio-Radio Production, Engineering Technology Design, Medical Terminology, and Nurse Assisting are officially among the best in the nation, returning with gold medals. Steven Muller Distinguished Professorships Awarded

St. Mary's College of Maryland Provost and Dean of Faculty Michael Wick announced two awardees of the Steven Muller Distinguished Professorships: Susan Goldstine, professor of mathematics, has been named the Steven Muller Distinguished Professor in the Sciences, and Lisa Scheer, professor of art, has been named the Steven Muller Distinguished Professor in the Arts.

'These professorships provide a wonderful means for the College to recognize and support outstanding faculty members. Both of these highly coveted positions offer its distinguished appointee an invaluable platform for deepening and disseminating their scholarly contributions. We're deeply grateful to Steven Muller and the fund which continues to support these awards," said Wick.

Steven Muller (1928-2013) was former chairman

and member of the college's Board of Trustees (1990-2003). He also served as board member of the College's Center for the Study of Democracy and was the recipient of The Order of the Ark and Dove Award in 2004, the college's highest honor. He established the distinguished professorships in 2000.

The Steven Muller Distinguished Professorship in the Sciences honors faculty whose accomplishments in the sciences establishes their expertise in a field of research relevant to our understanding of the world we inhabit. The Muller Distinguished Professor in the Sciences contributes to a vital dialog among scientists which is enhanced by the laboratory and field research contributions of St. Mary's College students.

Goldstine earned her doctorate in mathematics from Harvard University. She joined the faculty of St. Mary's College in 2004, and now serves as professor of mathematics. She is also an associate editor of the Journal of Mathematics and the Arts.

Her joint and individual artworks and associated research have appeared in Math Horizons, the Journal of Mathematics and the Arts, the proceedings of the international Bridges Conference, and various mathematical art exhibits in the United States and around the world. Together with computer scientist and artist Ellie Baker, she is co-author of the 2014 book "Crafting Conundrums: Puzzles and Patterns for the Bead Crochet Artist," which collects their extensive research on mathematical bead crochet. Goldstine has recently joined the board of directors of the Bridges Organization, which runs the annual Bridges Conference on mathematics and the arts.

The Steven Muller Distinguished Professorship in the Arts honors a faculty member whose accomplishments in the visual and performing arts distinguishes them among their creative peers. The holder of the Steven Muller Professorship participates in a broader world of art and culture that informs the opportunities for students at St. Mary's College by creating the foundation for their exploration and expression in the

Scheer earned her MFA in sculpture from Yale University. She joined the art faculty at St. Mary's College in 1981 and now serves as professor of art. She has exhibited her sculpture widely, including one-person exhibitions at the Baltimore Museum of Art, the Phillips Collection, the American Institute of Architec-

ture, and the Kreeger Museum, Nancy Drysdale Gallery, and Hemphill Fines Arts in Washington, D.C. Scheer has worked closely with architects in a number of collaborative projects and her public commissions include large-scale sculptures created for the new terminal at National Airport; the Southwest Terminal at BWI Airport in Baltimore, Maryland; the Petworth Metro Station in Washington, D.C.; the Palmer Museum of Art at Penn State University; and the Eastern District Federal Courthouse in Brooklyn, New York.

Scheer has received several national grants and awards, including a Pollock Krasner Foundation fellowship, two NEA fellowships, and a Maryland Arts Council Fellowship. She maintains a studio in Washington, D.C. and is represented by Hemphill Fine

Rockfish for lure casters; spanish mackerel and bluefish for trollers using planers and spoons; Cobia and channel bass for trollers, chummers, and sight casters; spot and perch for bottom fishermen; catfish most everywhere; snakeheads taking lures and bait; crabs galore; and bass, bluegill, crappie and pickeral in the fresh water.

If I left anything out, we've probably got that too.

The rockfish are remarkable in the mornings and mid-day on high tides in the Patuxent on all structure, under piers and on the rocks. Bomber Wind Cheaters in the blue silver and Hard Head Custom Baits popping rigs are what the rockfish are eating.

Up the Patuxent on all points and drop offs the rockfish are consistent for trollers, The lure of choice is a white bucktail with a black head, known to old timers as an "eight ball"

Spot are everywhere in the Patuxent and Potomac. The Potomac at Ragged Point is special; Sandy Point is the Patuxent hot spot.

Perch in the creeks will not bite on low tides. Incoming on a half tide to flood is excellent. Bett's Spin Root Beer and Beetle Spin white are what works for me.

Wanderings Aimless Mind





President Donald J. Trump Bestows Highest Scientific Honor to NAWCAD Engineers

President Donald J. Trump named two engineers from Naval Air Warfare Center Aircraft Division as recipients of the Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers in an announcement from the White House July 2.

Dr. Brandon Cochenour, an electrical engineer, and Dr. James Hing, a robotics engineer, will receive the Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers (PECASE), the U.S. government's highest honor, during a ceremony at the Daughters of the American Revolution Constitution Hall in Washington D.C. The White House confers on PECASE awards annually to name the nation's most outstanding stem professionals who show exceptional promise to advance science and technology.

"We cannot prepare to fight and win conflicts of the future without contributions from our talented workforce," said Rear Adm. John S. Lemmon, Commander of Naval Air Warfare Center Aircraft Division. "I'm incredibly proud of their commitment to all those who rely on the work we do."

Cochenour, an engineer with NAWCAD's avionics, sensors and electronic warfare division, leads research and development of the optics industry's next generation laser systems pioneering the use of "twisted" laser beams that can enhance sensing, imaging, and communications undersea, as well as in air and fiber, with both commercial and defense applications.

His work is uncovering new and more sensitive means of remote sensing and communications using light. Commercially, the research has applications in industries like oil and natural gas, autonomous automotive, wireless communications, and environmental monitoring. Importantly, his research helps enhance the Navy's information dominance and battlespace awareness at sea for anti-submarine and mine warfare missions.

"Being recognized as a PECASE awardee is truly humbling," said Cochenour. "Receiving the award is also a validation of the support structure that I am surrounded by at Pax. Without excellent mentors, world-class colleagues and talented students none of this success would be possible."

Hing, a lead of the warfare center's advanced technology branch, helped found the lab that researches and prototypes robotics that optimize aircraft carrier workloads. His work intends to increase sailor safety and efficiency on the flight deck while allowing service members to focus on work that is more important.

"To be selected amongst all the amazing engineers and scientists supporting U.S. government agencies was a complete surprise and still has me in a state of disbelief," said Hing. "I've been so fortunate in my career at NAWCAD to have had the opportunity to work on research that fully engages my technical curiosity and also has the potential for positive impact on the

safety and operational capabilities of our Sailors and Marines."

The PECASE awards are not firsts for either scientist. Cochenour is a NAVAIR Fellow, SMART Scholar, three-time recipient of the DOD's Dr. Delores M. Etter Science Awards, Maryland Academy of Science's 2009 Outstanding Young Engineer of the Year, and holds other trade conference accolades. The Department of Defense named Hing Scientist of the Quarter in 2017.

Established in 1996, the PECASE acknowledges the contributions scientists and engineers have made to the advancement of science, technology, education, and mathematics education and to community service as demonstrated through scientific leadership, public education, and community outreach. The White House Office of Science and Technology Policy coordinates the PECASE with participating departments and agencies.

NAWCAD supports the research, development, engineering, test and evaluation of all Navy and Marine Corps air vehicle systems and trainers. It is the Navy's largest warfare center with facilities in Patuxent River, Maryland; Lakehurst, New Jersey; and Orlando, Florida, the command delivers high quality, affordable products in support of military operating forces worldwide.



In addition to his parents, Charlie was predeceased in death by his broth-






